Course Description, US Government (CP) (one semester)

Students in 12th grade US Government study the US federal, state, and local governments, how they are related, and how they have evolved since their inception. Students begin with a study of the ancient democratic processes and the enlightenment philosophers who most influenced the framers of the US Constitution. Students then examine each branch of the federal, state, and local governments and how they have changed. Students focus particularly on the first, second, and fourth amendments, and how they have been interpreted by the Supreme Court throughout our history. Along the way, students must formulate and support opinions on the logic and morality behind the philosophical underpinnings of the US systems of government.

Each unit in Government lasts for 1-2 weeks.
